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Keynote speakers

Mira T. Sundara Rajan



The author is a Canadian expert on copyright law who has written, spoken, taught, and acted as a consultant internationally. She has held Professorships in the UK and Canada, including the Canada Research Chair in Intellectual Property Law, and obtained her doctorate at Oxford University studying post-socialist law reform in Central and Eastern Europe. Her publications on authors' moral rights are considered seminal works. She also has a special interest in India: a great-granddaughter of Indian National Poet, C. Subramania Bharati (1882-1921), she has pioneered the study of copyright in the poet's works, and her scholarship has helped to make law in the landmark Indian moral rights case of /Amar Nath Sehgal v. Union of India. /In the United States, she has been a visiting scholar at Stanford Law School and a Hauser Global Fellow at NYU.

Abstract "Moral Rights in a Post-Truth Era"

The fragility of truth - an unexpected casualty of the digital environment - has left many people wondering what, if anything, can be done to protect the integrity of knowledge and information in today's world. This question is undoubtedly among the most important public policy issues of our time. It involves almost unimaginable implications for democracy, public safety, and the very survival of human culture for generations to come.

Curiously, some part of a possible solution may be found in a perhaps unexpected place: copyright law. For generations, the copyright laws of Continental European countries, in particular, have developed a special branch of the law concerned with protecting the integrity of knowledge and culture. Known as moral rights, they allow authors and artists to assert authorship of their own works, and to object to any damage or distortion of those works in a court of law. By the late twentieth century, moral rights of attribution and integrity had been widely recognized around the world. They are currently included in the copyright laws of virtually every jurisdiction- although some caveats remain in the case of United States implementation of moral rights. Moral rights have also been widely embraced by developing countries and indigenous peoples, who believe that they help to prioritize culture, or see parallels with the rights in their own cultural traditions for recognizing and protecting knowledge.

The relevance of moral rights in the technological environment is simple: they are directly concerned with ensuring that original works of authorship are accurately attributed to their creators, and that those works are subsequently protected from interference. Both interests involve the protection of at least one important dimension of truth, authorship - the identities, works, and intentions associated with authors. But this basic premise leads to a number of interesting and complex questions. In the digital environment, who is an author? How broadly should copyright works be defined, and should moral rights protection be limited only to something that qualifies as a work? What happens in the case of knowledge, information, or even culture generated by machines? Is there scope for moral rights protection beyond the confines of authorship, and legal and practical means of making it possible and desirable to assert attribution and integrity claims in the broader public interest?

This talk will explore these fascinating implications of moral rights in the digital environment. Can moral rights help to find solutions for the challenges facing the integrity of knowledge in this unprecedented new environment?

The speaker is a professor of law whose book, Moral Rights: Principles, Practice and New Technology, pioneered the study of the moral rights of authors and artists in the digital environment.

Alexander Schouten



Alexander Schouten is an assistant professor of Communication and Digital Media at the Department of Communication and Cognition, Tilburg University, the Netherlands. His research interests include social media use, online collaboration, and online impression management. Within these areas, he is specifically interested in how different media capabilities affect the way in which people and organizations can effectively use new media technologies to communicate, to market, to work together, and to present themselves. Specific topics of study include online dating, virtual collaboration, and online privacy management. He published widely on the social aspects of online communication and digital media. Journals he published in include Communication Research, Journal of Computer-Mediated Communication, Human Communication Research, and Cyberpsychology: Journal of Psychological Research on Cyberspace.

Abstract "Impression Management and Impression Formation in Online Dating"

Online dating is extremely popular. At least 60% of singles have tried or are currently online dating, and 20% of couples have met online. In this talk, I will give an overview of our research on self-presentation and impression formation in online dating. Amongst others, I will discuss our research into Tinder profiles and what makes people decide to swipe left or right. I will show how important having a good profile picture is, but that other elements of a dating profile warrant attention as well. We then focus on the textual elements of dating sites, and see how language use affects people's perception of others. Finally, we discuss how our line of research adds to theories on cyberpsychology and computer-mediated communication and I will discuss some interesting thoughts and research ideas on the future of online dating, specifically long-term consequences. On the way, you might also learn some practical tips & tricks to improve your dating game.

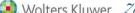
